### Who are Farmworkers?

- Approx. 1.5-2 million men, women, & children who plant, pick, & pack our fruits & veggies; work our dairies, nurseries, & feedlots
- 71% are Foreign-born workers; at least 50% are working without legal documentation
- Age of 12: one can be legally hired to work
- For every \$1 you spend on produce, a farmworker only gets 9 cents
- Agriculture is one of the most hazardous occupations in the U.S.
- Skilled laborers whose work is dignified & essential
- Our neighbors who have touched our food, and therefore our lives

# Group Leader Check List

## Individual Registration Process - ParishStaq Individual Registration Form

All students and adults will register as individuals to your group through a ParishStaq form. Group leaders will have access to all completed registration forms for their group. The link to the form will be emailed out to group leaders ASAP, but individual registrations will not be due until May 1.

### Program Logistics

- Group Reservation Fee of \$500 (paid via invoice through Archdiocese accounting)
- Due **April 1**: Finalized number of youth participants submitted via email to Jennifer Lautenbach  
*Once your finalized group number is submitted, your parish/school will be invoiced for the total participant fee (\$450 per youth participant) through the Archdiocese accounting department. Please notify your bookkeeper to be aware of this fee.*
- Due by **May 1**: Payment of \$450 per youth **AND** ParishStaq individual registration form submitted for each participant
- Due by **two weeks before your group's arrival**: Completed **Excel spreadsheet** with small groups list, car groups list, & sleeping rooms (*Excel spreadsheet will be provided by May 1.*)

### Required Paperwork

All required paperwork, for youth and adults, will be part of the single registration form on ParishStaq **and** can be found in the tool kit on the Registration Website (<https://archseattle.org/registration/>). Submitted paperwork on ParishStaq will be accessible by both the group leader and Agape staff.

#### Adult Chaperone Reminder:

In addition to the registration/paperwork form, all adults must have a processed *Archdiocesan Volunteer Background Check* **and** be trained/up to date with *Archdiocesan Safe Environment Program*

### Steps for Group Preparation & Formation

# Group Leader Expectations

The adults play a critical role in your group's Agape experience. Please read thoroughly so you have a firm understanding of what is expected of you (the group leader) and the other adult chaperones.

## Program Expectations for **ALL** Adults:

- All adults will serve as a small group leader, manage behavior, drive students throughout the week, and be a general role model of service and faith.
- All adults are encouraged to enter this week of service as their own service-immersion trip, we hope they gain as much as the youth.
  - See the *Adult Leader Expectations* (pg. 5) for further explanation of the role of all adults.

## **Group Leader Expectations (Youth Minister/Teacher/Lead Volunteer):**

- **Required to attend the ENTIRE WEEK of Agape.** *In some cases, one group leader prepares the group and a different group leader leads the week-of. A parish/school-designated group leader must attend the entire week.*
- Serve as the main contact person for the Agape Staff in preparation and throughout the week
- Form the youth participants before attending Agape, including but not limited to:
  - Sharing the Agape mission & expectations, Catholic Social Teaching, prayer and reflection, team building, expectations for community living (see pg. 7)
- Form the adult chaperones/leaders before attending Agape, including but not limited to:
  - Review the mission & work of the Agape Service Project
  - Help them understand their role as an adult leader (see pg. 5)
  - Teach them how to lead/facilitate a small group
  - Understand that during Agape we are trying to live in solidarity (ex: eating and living in community, week of simplicity, no side stops for treats or coffee, etc.)
  - Understand their role to help youth grow in their faith through serving Christ in others

**\*Group Leaders, Please Note\*:** adult chaperones can make or break this experience for your youth, for Agape staff, and for the communities we serve. Please ensure you have vetted the adult chaperones, and know they are not only capable of filling the logistical role but also eager to serve, enter into this experience, and understand their own call to a week of simplicity.

## **Chaperoning Ratios/Policies:**

- **There must be 2 adults for the first 8 youth, and 1 adult per 8 youth thereafter.** With groups of mixed gender, there must be both female and male adult leaders for the **entire** week.
- A minimum of 2 adults per gender is required for overnights (even if your numbers are below the 1 to 8 ratio) as per Archdiocesan Parish Youth Ministry Services Guidelines.
  - *This could be fulfilled in partnership with the chaperones of your week's partner group(s).*
- Adult leaders must be 21 years or older.
- **All adult leaders/chaperones are asked to be at Agape for the entire week.** *(We realize this is not always possible, please speak with Jennifer Lautenbach to discuss your situation. In some cases, 2 adult leaders need to split the week to honor work/family commitments.)*

## Adult Leader (Chaperone) Expectations

Adult leaders have an amazing opportunity to serve the youth while with Agape Service Project. Your involvement, support, and positive leadership will set a good example and create a rewarding experience for the youth of your parish/school and those of the community we will be serving.

**Agape Staff Roles:** Agape has 12 full and part-time staff during the summer who work together to coordinate and plan the entire program. This includes: facilitating morning and evening sessions of prayer and reflection, leading community building exercises, cooking, general cleaning, and facilitating all service projects. They will keep you informed about the service projects, activities, and expectations through nightly adult meetings. **Please note that the staff are not chaperones, drivers, or disciplinarians.** It is up to you to support the staff, enforce all rules, and make appropriate disciplinary actions if necessary. If a participant's behavior does not consistently align with the Code of Conduct, the Agape Program Coordinator may request that participant be sent home.

### **The adults serve many roles in addition to participating in the experience:**

**Driver:** Adult leaders are responsible for the transportation of all youth to and from Agape, as well as to and from service sites during the week. All drivers must be 21 years or older and have an approved *Archdiocese of Seattle Driver Information* form on file at their parish/school.

**Chaperone:** You help to set the tone of the week by maintaining a positive attitude, affirming the youth, and maintaining clear expectations. **As an adult leader you will chaperone youth at all times and are responsible for the behavior management of all youth.** It is expected that adults monitor lights out and ensure students are sleeping before adults go to bed.

**Participant:** During the morning and evening sessions, you get to participate with the youth in the activities, prayer, and discussion as well as help facilitate small group discussions.

**Small Group Leader:** Each parish/school will be divided into small groups, and you will lead one of these groups. As their small group leader, you will lead the small group conversations. You will also supervise the youth in their scheduled daily chores (but not do it for them). These chores give the youth ownership of their service week and are a large part of the experience of living in community.

**Role Model:** During service projects, you will monitor and guide the youth as they serve. It is important to be encouraging, keep them on task, and serve alongside them.

### **A few things to note:**

- All adults must fill out the individual registration form via the link from their group leader.
- Each adult leader **must** be trained within the Archdiocesan *Safe Environment* Program and **fill out and have processed** the *Archdiocesan Volunteer Background Check* before chaperoning. (Arranged through your parish/school). If already completed, it must be updated online as necessary.
- We ask that once you arrive at Agape to **not make any special side stops** to stores or cafes. During Agape we are trying to live in solidarity with our family in Christ, so we limit extra things that could distract us from the overall mission of service.

Most importantly, you get to help youth grow more in their Catholic faith through serving Christ in others. We thank you for your willingness to give of your time to serve the youth of your parish/school. Without your commitment and dedication, this week would not be possible. The youth are blessed to have supportive, encouraging, and faith-filled adults in their lives!

## Agape Expectations for the Week

These are some basic expectations that we ask everyone (Agape staff, youth, & adults) to follow and keep in mind during our week of service. We will have a great week if we all strive to apply these while we live in community and serve!

- **Be Respectful:** To all group members, adult leaders, Agape staff, Church/School staff & facility, the farmworker community, and everyone we encounter at service sites.
- **Think About Others While Living in Community:** We are working, living, and eating in community this week. Challenge yourself to think about the needs of others before yourself. Get to know new people! Clean up after yourself and help with chores. Respect the space and items of other group members.
  - a. **Honor Our Hosts** (the teachers who have given us their space this summer) – do NOT touch any of the classroom/school equipment in the rooms, hallways, gym, or stage
  - b. Do *not* enter the hallway that you are *not* sleeping on
- **Keep Quiet Hours Quiet (10:30pm-7am):** Be conscious of noise levels in the school building, near offices, & remember that we are in a neighborhood. Sleep is good & critical to our capacity to serve.
- **Be Mindful of Your Clothing:** Please dress comfortably, simply, and modestly, with particular attention to comfort, work, and activity. Many days will include manual labor, lots of movement, and being outside. Pants or longer shorts will be more comfortable when working on the farms or at the food bank. Be ready to work, play with kiddos, and lift objects.
- **Use the Buddy System:** When we are on service outings, you will need to stay in groups of three and have adult supervision.
- **Be Positive:** Strive to have a positive attitude towards all activities, reflections, and experiences. You will get back what you give to this experience.
- **Serve and Have Fun!:** Do everything with sacrificial God-like love (agape!), embody love & joy.

### Additional Notes:

- Expect simplicity during the week, embrace it as an opportunity to learn and enter into solidarity
- Do not bring snacks - all food is shared & eaten as a community striving for simplicity & equality
- Youth will not have their cell phones or other devices during service projects and programming
  - Group leaders may determine their policy during evening free time – Agape encourages a disconnection from technology for the week to best engage and be present.
    - *Suggested Best Practice:* no cell phones at all or a brief evening call home if needed
- Do not bring drugs, alcohol, fireworks, or weapons of any kind

## Formation & Preparation

**Preparation for your youth and your adults is necessary.** Educational and spiritual formation for the youth and adults will allow the experience to be richer and become more engrained into their hearts and minds, and therefore lived. Logistical preparation helps everyone know what they are entering into.

We ask that you host a **minimum of 3 formation/preparation sessions** for your group to help them be ready to serve, to live in community, to learn about the farmworker community they are encountering, and to root all their work in the love of Christ. These sessions should be for students and adults – so all can get to know each other and the content. An additional adult-only meeting is requested as well so you can prepare your chaperones for their roles.

Many of these suggestions may sound obvious, but even these basic practices and topics will aid in creating a community-centered group who is ready to be with others, give of themselves, and grow in faith. These will also help the adults figure out any individual or group dynamics that need to be prepared for and/or worked on in advance. Some of the suggested ideas have outlines in the tool kit.

Logistical Basics – In 1 logistics-focused meeting, we suggest covering:

- Distribute & review Adult Leader & Youth Participant Packets - *Emphasize the 'Agape Expectations for the Week' & ensure all understand the culture we are striving to create*
- Review & discuss the mission & work of Agape Service Project
- Plan fundraising initiatives & donation collection

Community Basics - Ideas:

- Basic community building & icebreakers to ensure group members know each other
- Preparing to live in community - ideas:
  - Cook & share a meal together
  - Practice chores by attending Mass together & then organizing pews & tidying bathrooms
- Work together - ideas:
  - Do a service project in your local community or at your parish/school
  - Promote, collect, and organize your food bank donations
  - Do yard work for an elderly parishioner or at your parish/school
- Pray & reflect together - ideas:
  - Include individual and small group reflections on a formation topic
  - Give students the opportunity to speak their reflections aloud in front of the whole group

Formational Basics – Topic Ideas:

- Any Catholic Social Teaching (ex: Dignity of the Human Person, Dignity of Work & Rights of Workers), Corporal Works of Mercy\*, Who are Farmworkers\*, Laudato Si overview\*, solidarity  
\* formation outline on this topic in tool kit

Notes: **1)** Many groups ask their students and adults to submit an 'application' expressing their intention to participate in a service-immersion experience; this helps the group leader to know their group members 'get it' and are attending for the right reasons. **2)** The group leader should not be meeting students nor adult chaperones for the first time when gathering on the day to leave for Agape.

## Overall Agape Information

**Arrival Time:** Please arrive in Bellingham **by 2:00pm on Sunday**. When you arrive, you will unpack your gear and donations. Dinner will be provided Sunday night, lunch will not be provided Sunday.

**Packing:** Please pack lightly. Everyone will be living in community and sharing rooms.

**Clothing:** Please dress comfortably, simply, and modestly, with particular attention to comfort, work, and activity. Many days will include manual labor, lots of movement, and being outside. Be ready to work, play with kiddos, and lift objects.

**Money:** One Agape shirt and all your meals and snacks are provided. There will be an opportunity for individuals to buy an Agape sweatshirt (\$30), shirt (\$15), or sticker (\$2), cash, check & card accepted. Other than that, there will not be any need for money during the week. Drivers/Groups will be responsible for purchasing gas for their vehicles.

**Free time:** There is designated free time each day. Youth may not leave the facility to go beyond the campus premises unless you are accompanied by a chaperone. We ask that you check in with Agape staff before leaving to make sure there is time do so. Even on the premises, chaperones should be aware of the activities and location of all group members.

**Cell Phones:** No cell phones or other devices for the youth during service projects and programming. Group leaders may determine their policy during evening free time – Agape encourages a disconnection from technology for the week to best engage and be present.

**Chores:** Small groups will be assigned chores each day, ex: meal set up/clean up, bathrooms, etc. Each small group, with their adult leader, will be responsible for the various tasks. This is a large part of the experience of living in community, as well as serving those in the group.

**Food:** In keeping with the spirit of Agape, the meals and lodging are simple. This is to help us grow in solidarity and bring us closer to those we are serving.

- All meals and snacks are provided. The kitchen is not to be used by youth outside of mealtimes, unless there are special dietary reasons. Please do not bring any snacks.
- *Please notify us of any special dietary needs on the participant list; some may require the participant with special dietary needs to supplement their daily meals with food from home.*

**Lodging:** Groups stay at Assumption Catholic School and Parish in Bellingham. Groups will sleep on the floor of the gym stage (males) or classrooms (females). Twin summer camp mattresses will be provided for each person. Anyone is welcome to bring their own air mattress/camping pad. Short showers will take place on 2 days at a local locker room.

**Medications:** All medications, whether prescription or over the counter, will need to be bagged and labeled with the participant's name and instructions for dispensing. The Group Leader has the responsibility of holding and dispensing medication for the youth they are chaperoning. Ensure that the parents complete the medication portion of the Parent/Guardian Consent Form and Liability Waiver.

**Departure:** Plan to **depart by 12:30pm on Thursday** of your mission week, a large brunch will be served on Thursday, but not lunch.

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## Agape Food Bank - Donation List

This year, Catholic Community Services (CCS) has taken over managing the food bank, but it will be familiar faces – Kelsey Harrington and Rosa Figueroa! Agape staff and participants will continue to volunteer at the farmworker food bank on Tuesdays (set-up) and Wednesdays (distribution).

To serve our food bank guests best, we ask that each group collect specific items. Our goal is to have enough to serve **550+ families**. As we strive to provide the most culturally-appropriate food items, all the food for the food bank is purchased. Please do not collect food from your community, instead focus on the specific item requested for your week or monetary donations.

Week 3: July 6-10	Backpacks & baby wipes

Week 6: July 27-31	School Supplies
Week 7: August 3-7	School Supplies

**MONETARY DONATIONS:** The farmworker food bank relies on donations, so any monetary donations are greatly appreciated. Money will be used to purchase items such as culturally-appropriate foods, protein (chicken or beef), diapers, baby formula, and other hygiene supplies all to ensure that we have enough for each family that comes to our food bank.

**BACKPACKS:**

- We will take **new** backpacks only – our goal is **550** backpacks
- All sizes and ages (kindergarten through high school) are needed

**SCHOOL SUPPLIES:**

- We will distribute fully stocked backpacks at the food bank on August 6
- Our goal is at least 550 of each type of school supply
- The Agape Program Coordinator will be in contact with a sign-up sheet for each parish to select which items they will collect

# Agape Packing List

## For Sleeping:

- Twin summer camp mattresses will be provided for each sleeper. Anyone is welcome to bring their own air mattress/camping pad
- Sleeping bag (suggested: with a twin sheet to cover the mattress) -OR- twin sheet set & blanket
- Pillow
- Ear plugs for sleeping (suggested)

## Personal Hygiene

- Towel/washcloth
- Toiletries (soap, shampoo, brush, deodorant, toothbrush, toothpaste, etc.)
- Baby/Body wipes (suggested for in between showers)
- Sunscreen
- Small bag (like a drawstring backpack or reusable shopping bag, to carry shower gear)
- Shower sandals (if desired)

## Clothing

5 days, 4 nights – *note: with mid-day showers on 2 days, 7 days of outfits are suggested*

- Pants (3+ pairs) (make sure to include clothing for farm work)
- T-shirts (if packing tank tops please ensure they are wide straps)
- Shorts (must be at least fingertip length – just above knee is better for work at the farms & food bank)
- Closed-Toed Shoes (required for food bank, good for activities with kids)
- Shoes for farm work (ex: tennis shoes or boots that are ok getting dirty)
- Underwear and Socks (7+ pairs)
- Sweatshirt & Jacket – check the weather for Lynden, WA (many of our activities are outside)
- Pajamas
- Hat or visor
- Swimsuit for showering (if desired)
  - Showers are in a high school locker room with individual curtained stalls

## Other

- Water bottle (A MUST!)
- Work gloves (for farm work)
- Backpack/drawstring bag to carry items to daily service outings
- Book, board/card games for down time, journal for additional reflection (an Agape journal will be provided)
- Cash, check, or card if interested in purchasing Agape swag (sweatshirt \$30, shirt \$15, stickers \$2)
- Any medications – follow the distribution guidelines of the group leader
- Good attitude and a servant's heart

# Lodging
